

## **QUESTIONS TO ASK YOUR DOCTOR**

## **Breast Cancer Surgery**

The goal of breast cancer surgery is to remove the entire tumor from the breast. There are 2 types of surgery to remove breast cancer: <u>lumpectomy</u> or <u>mastectomy</u>. If your treatment plan includes surgery, you may be unsure of what to ask your doctor.

Q:	What type of breast cancer surgery do you suggest for me? Can I have a lumpectomy plus radiation therapy? If not, why not?

Q:	Will I need other treatments before or after surgery? If so, who will coordinate my care?
Q:	Will some or all of my lymph nodes be removed during surgery? If so, how will this be done?
Q: A:	How long will I be in the hospital? Will I need help when I get home?
Q:	Will I have a drain (tube that removes fluid from the breast) in place when I get home? If so, how will I care for it? When will it be removed?
Q:	What side effects might I have after surgery (i.e., pain, bruising, scarring, numbness) and how long will they last? Which ones do I need to report to you? When can I get back to my normal routine?

Q: A:	What tests will be done on my tumor? How will this help guide my treatment plan?
Q:	Will part of the tissue removed be saved? If so, where and for how long? How can it be accessed in the future?
	If I want breast reconstruction, what are my options? When can it be done? Will you refer me to a breast reconstruction specialist?
Q:	When can I start to treat my scar on my own? Do you recommend products that contain ingredients like arnica, aloe vera or rosa mosqueta oil to treat my scar?
